## Still hard times in the Big Easy?

Money, money everywhere and not one cent fit for New Orleans. The recently passed \$787 billion porkulus bill contains Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid's, D-Nev., pet \$8 billion earmark to build a high-speed train linking Disneyland to Las Vegas. And Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., topped off the lard bucket ironically misnamed as the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 with tens of millions of dollars dedicated to restoring the habitat of the salt marsh harvest mouse, a treasured mascot of San Francisco's environmental extremists. But in the race to put together a bill that contained all of their most ambitious dreams, New Orleans fell off the Democrats' radar screen. A cynic might conclude that, now that Democrats own the presidency and large majorities in both houses of Congress, Katrina victims' usefulness as political props has been exhausted. Or I suppose we could say that Obama doesn't care about black people.



But Obama does have a lot of enablers coming to his defense. Louisiana's Democratic Sen. Mary Landrieu said, "I'm not saying there won't be a need in the future, but right now the focus is not on more money, it's on using what we have."
