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Aquatic Invaders Subject of Public Meetings

State Invited to Explain Boat Sticker and Boat Inspection Programs

This summer marks the beginning of two new programs that affect the boating public: boat stickers to raise money to prevent aquatic invasive species and roadside boat inspections to make sure aquatic invaders don't infest Idaho waterways.

Because the public may have questions about the need for these programs and the risk of aquatic invasive species, such as quagga and zebra mussels, local organizations have invited Rep. Eric Anderson, R-Priest Lake, and the Idaho Department of Agriculture to two public meetings on July 8 in North Idaho to explain the problem and proposed solutions.

Anderson sponsored legislation that made the transportation of invasive species illegal in Idaho and launched the boat sticker program. Amy Ferriter of the Department of Agriculture is working to create a statewide inspection program to keep quagga and zebera mussels, and other aquatic invaders, out of Idaho.
