Minnick endorsed by NFIB

Coeur d'Alene, ID - In these tough times, people are looking for elected officials who deliver on their promises of helping small-business owners succeed and create jobs.

Idaho Congressman Walt Minnick has done just that, and today he won the endorsement of the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB.) The group is the nation's leading organization representing small and independent businesses.

"Congressman Walt Minnick's commitment to Idaho's Main Street businesses speaks for itself.
