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GU center, Albanez lead way in upset over GW

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CORVALLIS, Ore. — With George Washington storming back within six points and the shot clock winding down Friday night, Gonzaga forward Sunny Greinacher didn't think. She let it fly.

The ball went through net with 3:15 left to play and the 3-pointer turned to be the game-winner as No. 11 seed Gonzaga upset No. 6 seed George Washington 82-69 in the first round of

the women's NCAA tournament.

"I loved the way we battled," Zags coach Lisa Fortier said. "I'm very happy with our performance."

Gonzaga (25-7) now plays No. 3 seed and host Oregon State (27-4) at 4 p.m. Sunday in Gill Coliseum. The Beavers advanced after beating No. 14 seed South Dakota State 74-62 earlier Friday.

But on Friday night, two senior Bulldogs led the way. Greinacher and guard Keani Albanez both scored 19 points and the team held No. 19 George Washington (29-4) to its second-worst

shooting night of the season at 29.3 percent.

But no points were bigger than Greinacher's dagger of a 3-pointer, only the second one she's made all season.

"The reason I made that 3 was because I didn't think too much," Greinacher said. "I just knew the shot clock was winding down."

George Washington coach Jonathan Tsipis knew that Greinacher was only 1 of 6 from the 3-point line coming into the game.

"That Greinacher 3 was huge.

Zags stay course

Wiltjer,
Pangos
take over

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SEATTLE — When the game got tight in the second half, probably tighter than it should have, Kyle Wiltjer got more animated. And more clutch. Same with Kevin Pangos.

The pair blunted several North Dakota State rallies with key buckets to help the second-seeded Bulldogs to an 86-76 NCAA tournament win Friday night in front of a pro-Zags crowd of 14,852 at KeyArena.

Wiltjer, who had 23 points and eight rebounds, and Pangos, who scored 15 of his 18 points in the second half, did most of the heavy lifting after the Bison (23-10) strung together an improbable comeback behind 6-foot-6, 240-pound reserve forward Dexter Werner's career-high 22 points.

"I just told the guys, 'We are not losing this game, we've come too far, we've worked too hard,'" Wiltjer said. "To be able to fight through the adversity was good for our first game."


Gonzaga (33-2) broke the school record for single-season wins and earned a date with No. 7 seed Iowa (22-11) at 4:10 Sunday in the round of 32.


Kyle Wiltjer shoots over Dexter Werner.
