LONDON, Nov. 11, 1918. a. m.—News of the signing of the armistice soon became known to those persons in the center of the city as flags were flown to the breeze, and the issuance of evening newspapers, for which there was a great rush at 11 o'clock. The first official celebration came when the old air raid siren was fired from all police and fire stations.

SPAIN CELEBRATES VICTORY OF ALLIES

MADRID, Nov. 11.—(Havas.)—Manifestations have occurred in the larger cities of Spain on the announcement of the victory of the allies over Germany. The news has occasioned the expression of sentiments favorable to the entente.

Two Victory celebrations will be observed in Spokane this afternoon as it can be made in progress this afternoon. The other will be a universal patriotic observance on Thanksgiving day, November 28, by the city and inland empire of the triumph which has been won by the energy and sacrifices of Americans and the dogged courage of the allies.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—By order of President Wilson, Provost Marshal General Crowder today directed the cancellation of all outstanding draft calls, stopping the movement during the next five days of 252,000 men and setting aside all November calls for over 300,000 men.

BILL'S ON THE TRAIN READY TO RUN AGAIN

CALL OFF DRAFT FOR THE ARMY--NOT FOR NAVY

Former Kaiser, Prince Willie and Hindenburg Keep the Blinds Down.

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Chains of Steel, Not Scraps of Paper, Bind Germany's Hands—Wilson Tells Terms of Armistice Signed Today.

Must Surrender Fleet—Move Back Far Behind the Rhine—Yield Guns, Railways and Stores—Great Cities in Allies' Power.

The peoples who have just come out from under the yoke of arbitrary government will never find the treasures of liberty if they look for them by the light of the torch. We must hold the light steady until they find themselves. And in the meantime, if it is possible, we must establish a peace that will justly define their place among the nations, remove all fear of their neighbors and their former masters and enable them to live in security and contentment. I for one do not doubt their purpose or their capacity.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The terms of the armistice with Germany were read to congress by President Wilson at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Assembled in the hall of the house, where 1 month ago senators and representatives heard the president ask for the declaration of war, they heard him speak the words which herald the end of peace:

The president spoke as follows: Gentlemen of the Congress: In these anxious times of rapid and stupendous change it will in some degree lighten my sense of responsibility to perform in person the duty of communicating to you some of the larger circumstances of the situation with which it is necessary to deal.

- 1. Military changes on western front: a. Cessation of operations by land and in the air six hours after the signing of the armistice. b. Immediate evacuation of invaded countries—Belgium, France, Alsace-Lorraine, Luxembourg—so ordered as to be completed within 14 days from the signing of the armistice. German troops which will have not left the above mentioned territories within the period fixed will become prisoners of war. Occupation by the allied and United States forces jointly will keep pace with evacuation in these areas. All movements of evacuation and occupation will be regulated in accordance with a note annexed to the stated terms.

LAST VICTORIES OF THE ALLIES

PARIS, Nov. 11.—The Belgian front of the Forest of Treton, east of Arras, has been reached by the French war office announced to Italian troops have entered the town of Hockley less than two miles from the frontier, and today the French have forced their way to the east bank of the Meuse between Lureux and Vigors. THE HAGUE, Nov. 11.—Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, commander of the German southern army group, and his staff, have fled from the town where the Germans had held out, according to the Belgian newspaper Leeuwarder. THE HAGUE, Nov. 11.—Street fighting is taking place in Warsaw, the capital of Poland. The allies' armies of the countries on the
