### State Voters Greet 2015 in Upbeat Mood


Washington voters are in an upbeat mood heading into 2015. At least 60% of voters interviewed for the recent *Elway Poll* said they expected things to get better over the next year for the country, the state, their community and their household, pushing the Voter Outlook Index to its third-highest mark in 10 years.

The Voter Outlook Index measures voters' general outlook. Unlike a consumer confidence index, it is intentionally broad and not focused specifically on individual finances. It asks voters how they expect "things will go" over "the next year or so" on a 4-point scale of "much better" to "much worse" for: 1) the country, 2) the state, 3) their community, and 4) their household. The combined Index has a range of +8 to –8. The 10-year average score is 1.18. The Index score this month was 1.94.

A dip last summer interrupted an otherwise steady climb in the Index throughout 2013-14. All four measures dropped in July and rebounded in December.

- •The largest increase was the belief that things are getting better for the country: 60% thought things would get better for the country, up from 45% six months ago—a 26% swing in the positive direction. That 60% is the highest proportion since April of 2012.
- •Household expectations, always the highest of the four, were their highest since 2007, with 70% expecting things to get better this year.
- •State expectations (64% "better") were at their highest point since 2000, although expectations were nearly as high from mid-2013 to early 2014 (62-63%).
- •Community expectations have stayed relatively steady and positive over the past two years, with between 63% and 73% expecting things to improve each time. This month's figure (68%) is right in the middle of that range.

As is typically the case, King County voters were the most likely to be optimistic with an Index score of 2.61 compared to 1.83 in Pierce/Kitsap counties; 1.92 in the North Puget Sound region; 1.37 on the Olympic Peninsula and Southwest; and 1.53 east of the Cascades.

### Sample Profile

502 registered voters, selected at random from registered voter lists in Washington state, were interviewed December 27-29, 2014 by live, professional interviewers. 19% were conducted on cell phones. The margin of sampling error is  $\pm 4.5\%$  at the 95% level of confidence. This means, in theory, had this same survey been conducted 100 times, the results would be within  $\pm 4.5\%$  of the results reported here at least 95 times.


The Elway Poll is an independent, non-partisan analysis of public opinion in Washington and the Northwest.





Puget Sound residents have been more optimistic than residents of the coastal and Eastern Washington counties. King County residents have been consistently the most optimistic in the state, except for a spike last July in Pierce/Kitsap.






# VOTER OUTLOOK INDEX ITEMS: LAST TWO YEARS In the next year, will things get better or worse. in:
