## **Classroom Discussion Question Grades 9-12**

Patti Warashina's *Woman with Pear* is a powerful piece that invites viewers to question and reflect on its symbolism. The sculpture is being placed in a historic part of Spokane known for its deep connection to the Japanese American community, highlighting themes of resilience and cultural heritage. Considering the symbolism of the pear and the history of Trent Alley, how can art serve as a tool for preserving and educating people about cultural and historical experiences, especially those rooted in hardship and discrimination? How might the placement of *Woman with Pear* in this specific location add to or change the impact of the art?

## **Classroom Discussion Question Grades 6-8**
