## **Classroom Discussion Questions College Level**

**Career Pathways and Respect:** The writer argues that skilled trades deserve the same respect as professional careers. What would it take for trade jobs—like electricians, mechanics, or welders—to be viewed as equally important career options in your community?

## **Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 6-8**

**Different Kinds of Success:** The author says you don't have to go to a four-year college to be successful. Do you agree? What are some other ways people can build good careers?

**Working with Your Hands:** The article talks about jobs where people build, fix, or create things. What kinds of hands-on jobs do you think would be interesting or fun to do?

**Respect for All Jobs:** Why do you think some jobs, like construction or plumbing, don't always get as much respect as others? What can we do to show that all kinds of work are important?
