## **Classroom Discussion Questions College Level**

**Structural and Systemic Causes:** The article highlights factors such as housing costs, unemployment, and mental health in contributing to homelessness. To what extent is homelessness a symptom of broader systemic inequality, and how should policy approaches shift to address these root causes rather than temporary symptoms?

How do social narratives and media framing shape these responses, and what ethical considerations arise from criminalizing or displacing unhoused populations?

**Pathways to Sustainable Solutions:** Short-term shelters provide immediate relief, but long-term solutions require structural change. What combination of housing policy, healthcare access, and economic reform might most effectively reduce homelessness, and what trade-offs or political barriers stand in the way of implementing them?

## **Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 9-12**

**Complex Causes:** The article explores the many reasons people become homeless—such as rising housing costs, mental health challenges, and job loss. Which of these causes do you think is the hardest for communities to address, and why?

**Community Responsibility:** The story highlights the tension between compassion and frustration in public responses to homelessness. What responsibilities do local governments and community members have to help people without homes, and what approaches seem most effective?

**Long-Term Solutions:** Temporary shelters can provide short-term relief, but they don't always solve the larger problem. What long-term solutions could help reduce homelessness, and how can education, employment, or health care play a role in that change?
