## **Classroom Discussion Questions College Level**

What ethical obligations does the U.S. have toward these allies, and how should those obligations shape immigration policy?

**Global Conflict, Local Consequences:** The article demonstrates how international conflicts and federal immigration decisions directly affect local economies, labor markets, and community cohesion. What role should local governments and communities play in responding to immigration challenges shaped by global events?

## **Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 9-12**

How can sudden policy shifts create unintended consequences for individuals and families who follow legal processes?

How should policymakers balance national security concerns with humanitarian commitments?

## **Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 6-8**

**Changing Rules:** The article explains that immigration rules changed, even for people who worked with the U.S. government overseas. Why might sudden rule changes be scary or confusing for families trying to build a life in a new country?

**Safety and Fairness:** Some leaders say stricter immigration rules protect safety, while others say they can hurt people who did nothing wrong. How do you think governments should balance keeping people safe and being fair to refugees?

**Impact on Our Community:** The story shows how immigration decisions made far away affect people living in Spokane. Why do you think global events can have local effects?

**Moving to a New Place:** The article talks about people who moved to the U.S. to be safe. What do you think would be hard about moving to a new country?

**Helping Others:** Some families came to the U.S. because they helped American soldiers. Why is it important to help people who helped us?
