Classroom Discussion Questions College Level

To what extent can grassroots movements create lasting political change? The Egyptian Revolution succeeded in removing President Hosni Mubarak, but many of the protesters' broader goals remained unrealized. What factors determine whether a revolution leads to meaningful institutional reform rather than simply a change in leadership?

How did technology and media reshape political activism during the Arab Spring? The article highlights the role of Facebook, Twitter, and independent journalism in organizing demonstrations and sharing information. Discuss the opportunities and risks that digital communication presents for modern social movements.

What responsibilities do governments and journalists have during periods of political unrest? The author describes both state-controlled messaging and the dangers faced by reporters covering the protests. How should societies balance national security, public order, freedom of the press, and the public's right to information?

Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 9-12

What conditions can lead ordinary people to risk their safety to demand political change? The article describes rising costs, limited political freedoms, police brutality, and corruption as factors that fueled the protests. Which of these do you think was the strongest motivator, and why?

How did technology and social media change the way the Egyptian Revolution unfolded? Activists used platforms like Facebook and Twitter to share information and organize demonstrations. How might the movement have been different without these tools, and what role does social media play in activism today?

Does removing a leader guarantee lasting change? Why or why not? Although President Hosni Mubarak stepped down, the article explains that many protesters felt the deeper political system remained unchanged. What does this suggest about the challenges of building a democracy after a revolution?

Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 6-8

Why do you think so many people joined the protests in Egypt? The article explains that many people were unhappy with corruption, unfair treatment, and not having a voice in their government. What are some peaceful ways people can stand up for change?

How can social media help people work together? During the Egyptian Revolution, many activists used Facebook and Twitter to share information and organize events. What are some positive ways social media can bring people together today?

What does freedom mean to you? Many Egyptians protested because they wanted more rights and a greater say in their country's future. Why do you think freedoms like speaking your mind and sharing your ideas are important?

Classroom Discussion Questions Grades 1-5

Why is it important for people to work together when they want to solve a problem? In the story, many people joined together because they wanted their country to be a better place. What are some ways you can work with others to make your school or community better?

What does it mean to be brave? The people in Egypt spoke up for what they believed was right, even when it was difficult. Can you think of a time when you or someone you know was brave?
